As always, we have a big focus on reading and aim to encourage all children to read as often as possible, ideally daily. Research shows that children who are read to on a regular basis have greater academic success and hear a vast amount of words. This helps children to read fluently and have a good understanding of the texts being shared. Remember, it's never too late to read with your child, regardless of ability/age. What is it?

This year, we have invested in a new synthetic, systematic phonics scheme which has been validated by the DfE. It comes with decodable books for children in Reception and Key Stage 1. It is also used as an intervention in Key Stages 1 and 2. We have confidence this scheme will support our learners throughout their reading journey.

Why is it colour coded?

Monster Phonics teaches children to read by enabling them to identify the individual graphemes (letter combinations) and being able to blend the sounds (phonemes) together to read the word. There are ten colour groups with each colour having a corresponding monster character. Ask your children about these characters—this will help with their learning and understanding.
